Yet the tennis was largely believable. The late Dean Paul Martin, the films young star, was not only a serviceable actor · but an accomplished tennis player. %he only way to improve,+ McEnroe told ATR, %s to play against players who are better than you · as opposed to players who are no better.+

But college tennis no longer attracts top players, he says, limiting its appeal.

Sargsian agreed with McEnroe that a junior player whose ranking is below the top 15 in the country has more to gain from college.

% you are good

enough to be a pro tennis player, I dong think going to college one or two years is going to hurt you.

%eah, you might start to make money a couple (of) years later,+Sargsian said, %but you're going to be mature.+Plus, he said, theres a downside to bypassing college.

%think it can hurt you if you go to the pros earlier because...you are going to start losing matches and it can really affect you mentally.+

for such bad tennis and bad dialogue about tennis.

In the real world, if a lowly British wild-card had a run like Peter Colt (to the finals), all England would be reeling. Hysteria and wonderment (think Boston Red Sox) would color every word from the press box. But in Wimbledon, Johnny Mac seems too busy being witty to care.

In one scene (and lon picking nits), Colt shows Mary the urban court his father taught him on. Whis is where I learned to play tennis, +he says. Not bad dialogue, but would two pros clarify which sport it was? Did she think it was racquetball?

Perhaps a general audience needs this, but that s why Wimbledon is definitely not a tennis players film the way Players

was. If you're a player, you want realism. In Wimbledon, the flying net rallies look like outtakes from %The Matrix.+

Itos not reassuring that when Colt makes the Wimbledongs semifinals, the match is put on a side court as if we wouldnot notice?
